VI. Presentation, Fabrizio D'Alosio, Vice President for WVU Enrollment Management

Fabrizio D'Alosio, Vice President for WVU Enrollment Management: I'm new to the university. I started on September 22nd. And when I came here, I made the decision to leave my previous university, which was University of Tennessee, Knoxville. And we had a great ride there. We saw enrollment growth, huge application growth. And when I interviewed for this opportunity, I thought there's no reason why WVU can't have a similar trajectory. The people, the university, the programs, there's so much going on here. And I

feel like there's so much opportunity. However, I don't know if we've really told our story all that effectively. So I came here because I wanted another challenge and I wanted to kind of roll up my sleeves and work with an amazing president, President Benson, a great leadership team, and amazing faculty to make it happen. So, and I'd be remiss if I didn't say great students, right? Because you all help sell this university every single day.

So the gist of it is the demographics in the state in terms of high school graduates is not good. Like it's on a downward trajectory. And we hit the peak of high school graduates this past fall. It was like 18,100, a pretty small number if you think about an entire state. And then this year it goes down to like 17,800. And it's gonna continue to go down all the way to 2039 to the point where the number is projected to be at 13,388 in the entire state, high school graduates. So that's a challenge for us, right? But that's something we need to think about and plan for ahead.

There are lots of markets where we do well in, like Pennsylvania. Okay, we do pretty well in Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania is a large market. It's gonna be down 17% over the course between now and 2039. If you look at all those states, you know what state's down the most? West Virginia, about 26%. Most of the markets where we do well are markets that are declining. What would you all do in that situation? Find new markets.

All right, so as we look at what we're doing, I'm not gonna get into all this, but we are doing a deep dive in all these different areas. Enrollment diversification. We talk a lot about freshman students here. We don't talk that much about transfer students, and that's a market that we could probably be doing more. Would you guys agree with me that we could probably do better with transfer students? Yeah, so we're not doing what we could. We could do better, though. There's online students. There's veteran students. Out-of-state students, obviously, international students. Financial aid strategy and cost and affordability. So we typically, we spend a lot of money on financial aid and scholarships at these universities. However, I think what we do a lot is many times we're not leveraging those resources in a way that creates a buying decision, meaning we're not allocating those resources in a way that drives enrollment, right? And so there's need-based, which if you have need and you meet the federal guidelines for awards, financial aid awards, that's one thing, but our institutional learning, like you guys familiar with the Climb Higher Scholarship? There's ways we can revamp that and rethink that grid. There are ways where, I know some of our colleges, all well-meaning, and they have some budget for scholarships. They're giving scholarships to some students in August and July. Those students already know they're coming, right? It's not making a difference in August and July. Let's give it to them in November and December to help drive a decision. Let's not give it to them after they've already decided to come, right? And so we're doing a lot of that, like heavy lifting, to get into this stuff, review the data, and see what will drive enrollment. Enhancing service. So it's really important that in admissions, we're giving you an amazing service

experience as a prospective student, but even while you're here, students are here, we need to make sure the experience that we talk about up front lives up to the hype. So when students are here, they are blown away with the Student Life staff and all the things going on on campus, that the residence halls are welcoming and friendly, and the Mountainlair, right? Like that there's space for y'all. You know, those types of things are really important.

VIII. The President's Report

President Street: We had the Caruth Center email us this week about a whole host of events that they're planning for the semester that they want us to promote on their social media. So I don't know if you've uploaded that quite yet. But I'll send you all of the graphics for that on Friday in Cabinet. Besides just going over some things that I did this week, Wyatt and I had a meeting with some of Elior's executive team. So we met with Darius's boss. I'll let Wyatt talk a little bit about how the meeting went and some of the substance of it. We gave them some very blunt advice, but they seemed to take it very well, which was good. Me and Thanh have been fighting with the wrapping company that's supposed to wrap the mutual aid cabinets, because they came the second week of the semester, said this is going to be an easy job. We'll have it done in a week. And Thanh emailed them every day last week, and he still has not gotten a response. He told me today on his way out, he went to Ohio for the rest of the week, that they just called him back and that he'll be working with them while he's away. So hopefully mutual aid cabinets will be done, and we can get the cookie event where we're promoting them on the books as soon as possible.

Besides that, I have a couple of upcoming meetings. Ro and I have got our meeting scheduled with the new incoming provost, Provost Wendland, on Saturday, February 21st, when she's in town for the Board of Governors meeting that weekend. We're going to be talking to her about the snowy weather conditions and building the infrastructure for online classes when classes are canceled, but it's still horrible and evil and cold and icy outside.

Besides that, me, Sydney, and Thomas will be giving a presentation to the staff council on Wednesday the 18th. I'm putting slides together, so don't worry. We'll be prepared. They normally ask us to come and present every year, so that's coming up next week. Besides that, I've been in BOG prep meeting mode. We had our committee meetings this week. On Monday, I had a Divisional Campuses Committee meeting. On Monday, I met with Potomac State and WVU

Tech student body presidents earlier that day, got some feedback from them, and then we had the committee meeting. It was all an executive session. And then I had the Strategic Plans and Initiatives Committee meeting for the Board of Governors earlier today. We got an overview about the Economic Impact Report. It pretty much documents everything that WVU does, from WVU medicine to the volunteering that you guys do, and puts a dollar amount on it to present WVU's financial impact in West Virginia and beyond. They built a whole website for it, so if you're interested in that, I'll send that website link out to the group meet. Besides that, the rest of the meeting was an executive session. The General Board of Governors meeting will be next Thursday and Friday from 2:30 to 7 PM, and then from 7:45 AM to 2:30 the next day. So it'll be a long day, and there's a long prep document, but I'll keep you updated as that happens. Besides that, we are doing the final prep for the West Virginia Students Day at the Capitol on Monday. We had an ACS meeting with all of the other student body presidents this Monday to answer some final questions and get prepared. To answer some final questions and get prepared for West Virginia Students Day on Monday. Logan and I did some prep work today, just prepping for it. We also did a media blitz on Monday. We were on the radio on Talk of the Town Monday morning. They published an article about it as well in Natural News, which is great. That gets that statewide audience, and that's the publication that a lot of our legislators are reading, which is fantastic. And then we did an interview with WVU News as well, which is aired on PBS. So some good coverage before we go down. Besides that, I have the list of students for West Virginia Students Day. Pretty much if you applied, you're going. We have 40 students from across the state heading down from eight of the schools. And we hit just about every major region of the state, which is fantastic.

We'll be splitting up between the House and the Senate. Like we mentioned last meeting, the Senate Bill 675, which would restore the student vote, was put on a committee agenda. It was put off that agenda an hour before the meeting. We've been in communication with the members of the Senate or, yeah, the State Senate Education Committee. And they said they really wanted students to be down in Charleston when the bill is on the committee agenda. And since it was Marshall Day and then WVU Day, they thought students would still be down there on that Thursday. And that did not happen. So we're still working with them to see how we can align the West Virginia Students' Day at the Capitol with the bill being put on an education agenda. Enough of the Board of Governors advocacy campaign. We've been starting our grant application for solar on the Evandale Library. We need three references from developers to apply to the grant. Mountain Valley Solar reached out to me earlier today to finalize their report. So we're making good ground on that. Me, Audrey, and Drew met yesterday, made a list of grant partners from the original application that the university applied to in 2018, and some new partners that will write letters of support. The grant application itself isn't super long. But because it's not

super long, they expect you to get like 10 letters of support, both from faculty at the university, members that work at the library, and also community members. So we put a list of emails together and started reaching out to them to get those letters. That grant is due in April, so we still have a good amount of time on that. Besides that, I know I still owe a ton of you who went to WU Day excuse letters. If you're going to West Virginia Students' Day at the Capitol, I'm getting you excuse letters as well. And then, Lauren, thank you for reminding me. I'm going to get excuse letters for the Big 12 on the Hill people as well. So I sent all of your names and emails to Thanh. He's going to just plug and chug away at giving you those excuse letters. He'll email them directly to you, so then it's your responsibility to email them to your faculty. Besides that, the last thing I have is we worked in the chief of staff meeting this Monday to start to put a list together of faculty, staff, and administrators that just SGA has worked with this year. We want to do some sort of thank you letter or find some sort of way to just honor them and appreciate them for the work that they did this year. We have a pretty good list, we feel like. But obviously, we don't work in every little project at the university. So committee chairs, if you could take five minutes at the beginning of your committee next week and just kind of document all of the faculty, staff, and administrators that you've worked with and email them to Olivia, we'll make sure that we don't miss anyone that you guys worked with this year. That's all I have for you.

IX. The Vice President's Report

Vice President Jones: I need all of you to take out your phones right now and go to the Hardesty Festival of Ideas website, which has been updated, and request your tickets because all of your committees have been canceled for next Wednesday for the West Virginia Politics Night, which I hope you all will be in attendance for. The tickets are free, so it will be a good night. Senator Joey Garcia will be there, as well as Amelia Kinsley, Sam Workman from the Political Science Department, and maybe Senator Queen.

X. Committee Reports

Senator Silva: We made the baskets for international students. And we are going to, this is not set in stone yet, and we are still going to make the reservation, but we are planning to table sometime next week about the student support groups for NAMI. So, we'll send information on that whenever we get all of that approved, but just keep that on the radar.

Senator O'Neal: We started working on our LEED Certificate of Legislation today, in regards to green buildings on campus, and for those. Then yesterday, we held a student advocacy

training with the students here at the club, and I'm really happy to announce that we've almost gotten 35 students signed up for E-Day. That's super cool. We even got a G&G professor who teaches Paige and Audrey to cancel her class for E-Day and send all of her students, so that's cool. And about E-Day, we'll host an info session for students next week sometime to learn about dress code and arrival times and stuff like that, so stay tuned for that. Finally, our trip to Pittsburgh was confirmed by the University of Pittsburgh for March 31st, and the G&G Department has agreed to offer transportation for up to 20 students, so yeah, that's what we have for reports.

Senator Howell: We are sending our request for tabling about the resources survey in the middle of March. Lauren is waiting on updates from dining, should be finalized soon. Carrie is coming on March 4th to the committee.

College Senator Mugnano: We're working on getting a lot of our projects wrapped up. I had my one-on-one with Connie yesterday, and basically all of our projects are like 85% done, but we need to push them over the edge. So, Gabe's working on getting his student organizations officially here and all through the process of becoming student organizations. Dominic's working on the anti-advertising on InfoStation's legislation. Gabby is working on getting our camp training mandatory for the Health Sciences 101, and Bradley is working with Jack Thompson on his website, and they're both getting meetings set up right now to get their internship website up and running.

College Senator Qian: So, tomorrow we have a meeting with Stephanie Young about our project, and so we're just discussing what we're going to talk about. And we also, we filled out a Senator Project form.

XI. Assembly Reports

President Pro Tempore Robinson: The dean search is going well for the Eberly College, and they will have chosen a finalist to bring to campus tomorrow. There are a few underclassmen students who have voiced concerns about Eberly Edge, and they'll be bringing those concerns to the dean next week, along with some undergraduate TA conversations. I am also working on proclamation and recognition of Black History Month. The City Council did something similar, passed a proclamation recognizing Black History Month, and I would like to do the same thing with an emphasis on black alumni and current students.

College Senator Scott: So, I'm involved in a lot of group projects right now, but I keep needing to update everyone on a little victory that I recently had within the School of Theater and Dance. There was kind of an issue with communication. Not all theater minors were being communicated with the same way that the majors were, as well as it was a very convoluted process for anybody involved in auditions for the spring and fall seasons, but I was able to address this, and I, so far as I know, it's been fixed and addressed, so stay tuned, but that's just a little victory that I'd like to share with everyone.

Senator Cole: Zadi and I have a 4 o'clock tomorrow with Chuck Roberts. Chuck Roberts is the ADP of Facilities Management, so if you have any concerns specifically related to, I think we're talking about campus lighting and some of the reports that we gave to them from the safety walk, you can email them to us and we will report them to him, but he gave a spreadsheet of everything that we sent them from the safety walk, and it says whether or not it's completed or not, or why it hasn't been completed. I think there's about 40 reports, I think over half of them have been completed from this fall safety walk. So, if you have anything that, anything that's changed since, I believe October is when we did the safety walk, then you can reach out to us and we will convey the message tomorrow.

XII. Executive Reports

Will Andrews, External Chief of Staff: All right. So, some general updates, but first and foremost, I want to recognize that our executive of the month that we chose was Thomas Giggenbach for his efforts in tabling. So, a round of applause. And then for my updates, Colin put me in contact with several department chairs to organize some student-faculty mixers and student input events as a part of the batch initiative that he had mentioned. For the Renters' Right to Repair campaign, me, Mimi, and Ethan have begun meeting with each other bi-weekly, and we're starting to look to garner support from city councilors for that bill, so stay tuned as we're going to need a lot of support from SGA when it comes time to vote on that in the city council meeting. Mimi helped me find potential seating for the PRT stations. They come from the closure of Alderson Broadus and their hospital, so I'll be setting up a meeting with Stephen Posniak to discuss this seating and some other PRT stations, some other PRT station upgrades relating to temperature control. And finally, I know a lot of you guys wanted to purchase some additional SGA merchandise, like the crew necks and quarter zips, so I created a form to gauge interest for it so that we'll be able to get a number for the entire order. I'll send that to the group meet after the meeting, and the more items that are ordered in total, the cheaper it's likely to be for all of us to purchase it. So, interns are also welcome to fill out the order form.

Wyatt Armbruster, Hospitality Taskforce Chair: As Colin kind of alluded to earlier, we had a meeting with two people from Elior corporate, and we mostly just kind of shared our feedback with how dining's been going for most of the year. Most of the issues you brought up kind of related to the inconsistency, especially with dinners, the lack of freshness in general to food, and kind of like the limited variety of menu items. There was, of course, some good feedback. For example, we expressed some good feedback relating to retail, which has definitely gotten better, but our biggest concern was over the quality of the dining halls as a whole. One big thing that came up was the possibility of a made-to-order station being introduced in the dining halls. Like, you'd walk in, there'd also be like, I don't know, tacos or something, which would be a good solution for like more variety, made-to-order so it's fresh, and that was one big thing that came up. It kind of tossed around a bit. We also discussed the state of the Corner Pizza, which isn't very good, and we also kind of threw back some ideas about how it could be fixed, what could we possibly put in there to replace it maybe. And also some feedback on grab-and-go locations, most notably the grab-and-go in the Lair, because it's kind of not the best compared to what it was under Sodexo. And second, there will be a Task Force meeting next week, and so if you have any sort of critique or grievances for dining, please let me know.

Mimi Ferguson, Community Engagement Coordinator: So first, I just wanted to thank everyone who came to the Rosenbaum House on Sunday and gave up your Super Bowl Sunday time. It was a really good event. I think it was probably the best experience I've had volunteering at the Rosenbaum House so far. I think this was my fourth time getting to go with SGA. One of the workers, I think his name was John. He actually came up and played his guitar and sang some folk music while they were eating. So we were able to talk with him and mingle with a lot of the different people who were staying at the house. It was definitely more people were up there than usual, I think, because they were going to play the Super Bowl on the big TV screen they have up there. It was a really good time, and they definitely were really appreciative of it. So thank you to everyone who came and helped out, and thank you to those who donated some food. We were able to shave off like \$70 or \$80 from our internal budget request because of you guys, so thank you so much. So that was our local interest month of service for this week. Next week's month of service theme is animal-related, so we were going to go volunteer with Mountaineers for Mutts. I actually was able to finally make contact and speak with them, and they just don't have enough full-time volunteers to be able to coordinate something with even a group of five people. So we are going to go ahead, and we've confirmed we're just going to do a drive for them. They specifically were like, you can't really come with a big group, but you can use your big group to try to get us some stuff that we need. So starting Monday and running

through the end of the month, just so we have a little bit more time to get some stuff together for them, we are going to run a drive. You can find the box for it up in the lounge starting on Monday. They're asking for dog food, litter, puppy pads, pretty much anything animal-related. They mainly have cats and dogs, though, so I will stress that. And then the number one thing that they asked for, they said they go through a lot, is kitten food and just like cat food, both wet food and dry food, just because they have so many kittens and cats. So the other thing that they wanted me to ask of you guys, obviously if you have time, and this just goes as generally speaking, not just for next week, they do have a location at Pet Smart where you can go see some of the kittens that they have. You can go to iServe and just type in Mountaineers for Mutts, and they're always looking for people to fill in the time slots that they have open up there. I don't know if any of you guys have ever been to the Pet Smart, but there's so many times that the lights are on and those kittens are in their little cages at Pet Smart, but the door's locked because they don't have a volunteer to be able to be in there with the kittens, and letting them out and letting customers come and interact with them. So if you guys ever have free time, I'll send the iServe link for that. It's really good, it's a good organization. I got my kitten from there in October, and he is great, he's super special, and they take care of everything for you. They paid for all of his shots, they got him fixed, and he's really sweet. So that's what we'll be doing, and then hopefully for the fourth month of service, which will be the week after next, that's K-12 related, I should hopefully have more information about that for you guys next week. I'm still trying to figure out all of the details with the high school on that. So if anybody has any questions, I'd be happy to answer them, but I'll send the iServe link. Thank you.

Joley Chikombero, Menstrual Equity Taskforce Chair: Happy to announce that we collected over 5,000 period products, so I'd like to say thank you to everyone who helped me put everything together, and thank you to everyone who donated.

Thomas Giggenbach, Internal Senates Liaison: I'm going to start with the faculty senate meeting notes. First off, just a little bit about some curriculum and attendance policies. I don't know if anybody knew this, I did not. If teachers have an attendance policy where you get points for attendance, then you can lose points for not attending, but if there are no attendance points, then attendance actually can't affect you, so you can't fail a class for attendance if you're not grading on attendance. They can put whatever they want in their syllabus, but that's the actual university rule. I just thought that was interesting.

Next up is Benson in the state gov rep. They just said that the WVU capital went really, really well, so great job to everybody who went. Benson talked about his presentation to the House Finance Committee, where they talked about the request for the Coliseum AC. They

wanted to expand medical school class sizes, both WVU, Marshall, and the DO school down in Lewisburg. Beyond that, he talked about the \$13.4 billion impact between WVU and WVU Medicine. They talked about all the federal funding we're getting, \$15 million for phase two of the dental school revamp, \$12 million for the RNI neuromodulation center, \$2.5 million for an upgrade at the WVU Weirton emergency room, and then \$6.5 million for improving the PRT guideway system. I don't know if it will make it less bumpy, but we got money for it. Shout out to the Sustainability Committee and Andrew. They talked about how Andrew O'Neill has 100% of the Sustainability Committee support, so I just thought I'd put that out there. Beyond that, Benson wanted to say that we're still pursuing the Association of American Universities and National Cancer Institute designations, but those are the long-term goals he talked about. Some search updates, the CFO, they are relaunching it. The VP for research, it's beginning April 1st. The CIO, which is an ITS role, is ongoing. The Dean of the Library is announced soon, and the College of Law Dean search is also ongoing. And then finally, it was Ro talking about the Harvesty Festival ideas, so you guys should probably go to that. It looks pretty cool. So inside the Faculty Senate, I'm part of the Academic Technology Committee. All they talked about were issues with information flow between faculty and IT, stuff like rolling out Blackboard and having to log into Zoom every day without actually telling faculty. However, it seems there's a budding relationship between the committee and IT, so hopefully that will be fixed in the future. And then generally, I just wanted to thank everyone who tabled for and the Commons Department who created social media posts and flyers for the first day complete tabling thing. Thank you all.
