I. Call to Order

VI. Presentation, “Vision for Greek Life,” Kyle Malcer-Shatto, Director of Fraternity and Sorority Life

*Kyle Malcer-Shatto, Director of Fraternity and Sorority Life:* I'm Kyle. I'm the director of fraternity and sorority life as of October, so newer here. I came from the University of Tampa as the director of fraternity and sorority life there. I worked at a headquarters previous to that. My goal is to be transparent with how it operates, how it's changing, and how it fits into the broader student experience at WVU. One of the things we created when I got here was a five-year plan called The Next Summit, which is our roadmap to how fraternity and sorority life will be held accountable, improved, and aligned with the values

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of this university and its students. So WVU has made a lot of changes to fraternity and sorority life. Looking back in 2018, the university implemented a reset focused on oversight, safety, and structure. That work mattered, but we're now at a point where simply reacting to issues isn't enough. Today, we have 39 recognized chapters and thousands of students involved. Some contribute positively to campus, while others may have caused harm or frustration, and both realities can exist within this type of community. The Next Summit's about moving forward with clearer expectations, stronger accountability, and a better student experience for members and non-members alike. The vision of this program is not about protecting organizations. It's about supporting students. We want fraternity and sorority life to contribute to scholarship, integrity, belonging, and engagement, values that matter to all students, not just Greek-affiliated ones. And this work aligns with WVU's broader goals around student success, retention, campus culture, and community impact. When Greek life works well, it supports a campus. When it doesn't, it can cause a ripple effect, and that's why alignment and accountability matter within our Greek community.

## VIII. The President's Report

*President Street:* Hello everyone. I'm glad you survived the cold this morning. I know it was like four degrees when I left my apartment today and that was absolutely horrible. Ro and I had our monthly meeting with Benson yesterday and we talked to him about that specifically, particularly about snow on sidewalks. I know it's an issue we had where the city charges landowners with plowing their sidewalks. And a lot of times, as I'm sure all of you know, that doesn't necessarily happen. So we talked with Benson, explained that element of the city to him because he wasn't aware of that. I asked him to reach out to the mayor and the city council's office to create a partnership, uh, particularly around areas like your place where we have a lot of students and it's university housing, uh, but it's you, not the university's jurisdiction to plow those sidewalks. Today we also got some student feedback about some students who have fallen. So we sent those, uh, stories directly to President Benson as well. So he is aware of this issue and we'll work with Ethan as well, um, to communicate some of the issues of sidewalks not being plowed to city council as well.

Besides that, we also talked to President Benson about some upper division online classes. I know Ro and I have experienced this. We've heard some other students have

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experienced this where you have a 400 or 300 level class that's been moved online and it's like they put every YouTube video that comes up in a topic in the Ecampus and it's just like an ocean of information. So we're going to work with the provost office going forward on some quality control for Um, some of our online classes.

Besides that, we had our January advisory council of students meeting where we targeted specific legislators and the House and Senate education committees, um, and reached out to them about supporting a student vote. Logan will have more information for you about that. We are also working with Senator Oliverio to introduce a bill that would just, um, re implemented the student vote. Thank you, Senator Stenger, for writing that bill. We're still working with, uh, Mike to get that introduced. Besides that on the campus solar front, we started the application for the EBSCO solar grant. It's a lot smaller. I know I haven't talked to the grant writers about this. I started the application afterwards and then we got school off. The application is smaller than what it's been in years past. So that's nice. We have a little bit less to do, but it's still a pretty beefy application for a big grant. We're getting some funding once we secure or whether we secure the grant or not, we're getting some funding from the solar finance fund for the solar project on Evansville library as well, which is perfect. And then we're working with three solar contractors to do some engineering and technical work, just designing the system so we can submit, uh, those economic and engineering analyses to the grant.

Besides that, we have a whole bunch of meetings coming up. Some members of cabinet are meeting with, uh, Aaron Neumeyer and some people in dining about Elior's contract. They only got a year long contract, so they're looking to do an extension and they wanted some feedback. If you have any general feedback about Elior and Wyatt, I'll talk to you about that as well. Besides that, we're also meeting with the CIO or the head of ITS and just like the internet services here at WVU. We met him at a provost dinner and he was interested in hearing student feedback, so he invited us to meet with him. So if you have any feedback about the internet, please let us know. I know the one thing we were going to bring up to him is there's a lot of places in Evansdale where the internet's really spotty, particularly in Statler. Also, we're going to talk to him about coverage there. We are also meeting with the director of the hub. The hub is being completely redone, rebranded. They're going to open up the doors to the hub. They're going to have everyone come back in person, um, because they've gotten a lot of negative feedback about the hub. So we're going to be doing a walkthrough with the director of the hub next Monday. So if you have any feedback on the hub or you can even come to that meeting as well, just let me know.

Besides that, we were asked to present at the Staff Council on February 18th, just about what's been going on this year. The staff council normally asks SGA to come and present. So Thomas, I'll work with you on coordinating that presentation. Besides that, we have a couple

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other just miscellaneous things. I had a meeting with Fabrizio, our new vice president of enrollment and Jim Fisher, a special assistant to the president about implementing our enrollment data that we did in our survey, asking students why they came to WVU and to his presentation to the board of governors, and for our February meeting. We're still waiting on the mutual aid counties to be wrapped. They came and said that they can wrap it. We're just waiting for them to come and actually wrap it and then we'll be good to go.

Besides that, I'm sure you see on the agenda, we have a couple of internal personnel changes, um, because the state gov stuff is wrapping up so much and we've had some ground on the student health and aid grant. Logan will be taking over the state gov role completely to finish out a lot of our smaller executive projects, things like the Gaga ball pits, um, and some PRT upgrades. We'll be taking over the chief of staff position, particularly since the alumni relations position, uh, ended with homecoming for the most part. He was super successful in that role, just being able to knock things out and get things done. So Will will be taking over the external chief of staff role. I'm sure you all know, Elise resigned her senatorship. So Bradley was the next on the candidates list to be moved up into that role. He accepted and you all will have to approve these changes today. Bradley will be moving up and then we will open an application for a new graphics officer and a new academic partnerships liaison, uh, at the end of this meeting. Besides that, we also worked with Gary Furby and we're securing some SGA storage at Evansdale crossing. So when we do tabling at Evansdale crossing, we don't have to lug a table on the PRT and bring it all the way to Evansdale. So they're finalizing exactly where that space would be, but they said they have some space for us by the end of the semester. So that's all, that's all I have for you today.

## IX. The Vice President's Report

*Vice President Jones:* There are a couple updates. One of the hard to see festival ideas is coming into its final days of planning. I would say the speaker schedule will be solidified on February 1st. Between February 1st and the first day of the Festival of Ideas, which would be the 16th of February, is when all the promotional materials will begin to be released and I've been working with communications Carmen Congelio and communications to set up that for in terms of the content of the festival ideas so the festival ideas will be the 16th 17th and 18th of February from 6 to 7 30 p.m. the first night will be in the Gluck theater the second night will be in what is the the bougie lecture hall and Reynolds does anyone know the name of that I can't remember what Reynolds doesn't no one knows well the big really nice room and Reynolds okay that is where the second night will be at the first night we'll be doing a panel on artificial intelligence with Amy Seifert who's been championing some really great research here at WVU on AI ethics

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she actually did a presentation to us I'm during try board and it was a really insightful and there are also some other members of President Benson's AI task force Colin is actually on that as well who will be participating on that panel as well and then the second night we'll be having a business and innovation panel one of the people on the panel is going to be Marilyn McClure DeMere who is on the alumni board with me she's a vice president of legal at nationwide so I'm excited to have her come and then the last night will be a politics night right now I'm trying to work that out with Joey Garcia he's busy right now but uh he's pretty confident he'll be there so we'll see but um that will be last that will be finally announced on February 1st and then in other news we will be taking a cabinet to the distinguished alumni Academy dinner which will be this Friday I'm at the Erickson Alumni Center I'm on the awards and recognition committee for the alumni board and so we nominated and selected for alumni to honor at the Academy some of those include Michael J Florio he's a commentator on ESPN you have Nitin Kambani he has essentially champion ATM technology and founded about an eight billion dollar company and he is of course another WVU alumni and then we also have Morris Morrison who is an author thank you Olivia so those are some of the people who are going to be honored at the Distinguished Alumni Academy this Friday.

#### X. Committee Reports

*Senator Cole:* Okay, so last week, we actually did a lot of time now. We had a UPD tour on Thursday. I think I talked about this last week, so I won't talk about it that much. This meeting, I absolutely forgot that I invited the university police to come, so they walked in, and I had a good meeting with them. I don't want to turn a blind eye to the students' reactions of campus not being closed today. It's something that I've been monitoring, like monitoring student opinions on social media. We talked to university police today about it. The preface, Chief St. Clair is on the, I think it's called the TAC team, from what I understand. It's the team that decides campus emergencies, from the Emergency Operations Center for the university. She kind of gave us her insight being on that committee on how they cancel class, how they determine whether a delay happens, and then she kind of echoed some of the things that happened in that room, especially with the snow removal and lack thereof of sidewalk shoveling on the downtown and Sunnyside areas of the city of Morgantown, and I believe those concerns are being elevated to the city of Morgantown. We also talked about talking to the provost's office about trying to figure out why there isn't a virtual policy, because as you may know, the school 30 minutes south of us, who nearly got the same weather as us, is on virtual for the rest of the week. So that's something we talked about in the majority of the meeting, is like I said, I don't want to turn a blind eye to student opinions on this campus when it comes to their

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safety. I did, like Colin said here multiple times, that students were either transported to Ruby Memorial or Mont General due to accidents that happened on the sidewalks in Sunnyside, so I think it's important to hold the university accountable for that and discuss how we can work towards fixing some of those issues and ensuring the safety of our students. We also talked about the alcohol safety fair. Tentatively, this is going to be on March 5th from 3 to 5 on Matt Lair, I'm sorry, I left. It's going to be March 4th from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Matt Lair Green. On Wednesday, then there will be an Evansdale one from 3 to 5 at the Rec Center on Thursday, March 5th. I will reach out to Mimi to see if we can get this on a service sign up, but I will have to make sure if those dates are correct. The alcohol safety fair is pretty much just this event that UPD is putting on with multiple departments. They're going to be bringing in certain businesses and stuff, as well as WVU Athletics, to work on educating students on alcohol safety as we approach St. Patrick's Day weekend and spring break. And then, we just kind of touched on all the live safe stuff, but that's about it.

*Senator Howell:* So, Laura talked with the dining hall people about the trifolds, and we're just doing some final touches on that, but it should be done by the end of the month. Tatum is trying to get a new one done for the resources survey, but we haven't gotten anything straightened out on that yet.

And Lily couldn't make it to the meeting, unfortunately, but she's reaching out to Carrie now, and she'll hear something back about the closets.

That's all I have for now.

*Senator Torres:* So, Connections Committee, we just kind of focused on the welcome baskets, so we started prepping them, so that way next week when we get the rest of our supplies, we can just put it all together and give it out to the new incoming international students. So, that was what took the majority of our committee meeting. And then, we also talked about potential dates for another group meeting. So, we're still working on that. If you're interested, and also, just brainstorming some tabling ideas and advertising ideas for other projects that we can bring out.

*College Senator Tadros:* We ended up receiving 25 sets of goggles and aprons, which was pretty good. We were proud of that number. The only thing was that this only happened in O-Chem 2 labs, which we'd like to expand on. So, Tyson is working with the FSC, or FCS, or whichever one it is, to move into doing biology labs and Gen Chem labs as well this semester, so

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hopefully, we'll be able to expand on that number. And then, we also planned our dean meetings to work on getting the undergraduate TA data to be collected, presented, and see where we can go with that, and hopefully, make something happen before the start of next year.

*Senator O'Neal:* In sustainability today, we went over the data plan legislation, that and the way it has been working on. So, hopefully, we'll see it next week. We're hoping to introduce it to the Bureau of Legislation soon. So, that's hopefully done. We went over that, and then, we set up meetings with the Visitor Center and Orientation to kind of go over our bus legislation from last semester, figuring that those two entities are probably going to have to do a lot of talking, like coming up with new students, so hopefully, they can talk about the buses. We also did some eDay updates, so right now, I think we're at 22 signatures on the sign-up sheet. So, we need, well, we have 50 spots, so we're hoping to get to like 32, which I know sounds kind of unimpressive out of 50, but last year, we went over a couple students, so that's a pretty big jump, and a group of 32 students can do a lot. We also met with Thanh and Morgan this morning, or I guess this afternoon, and talked about our Pittsburgh trip for the sustainability tour, and we're hoping to meet with the University of Pittsburgh Student Government Advisor next week sometime to work out some more logistics.

*College Senator Mugnano:* I was supposed to have a meeting with the Chamber of Strategic Communications team head, but that was Monday, and we have a snow day, so that's going to be rescheduled, but we're emailing about it now, but basically, we're super close to getting the Chamber's FAQ page up and ready for students to input their questions, and then we also just went over future ideas for this committee, making sure that we're aware of the timeline of the rest of the semester, so that we aren't getting in projects that we can't finish, and then making sure we're doing work that we still have time for, and some of those ideas we were talking about, Fashion Show for the Health Sciences closet, and maybe charging the crisis for those donations going to the RAC, bringing healthy food back to the HSC farmers market, Narcan treatment for the first semester classes for HSC, and we're also looking at awarding, getting some awarding for the Hydration Station Bureau, and that's what we focus on today, so thanks.

## XI. Assembly Reports

*President Pro Tempore Robinson:* Okay, so looking at our actual meeting for the Dean's Search Committee today, there were over 60 applicants to be the new Dean of the Eberly College and we've literally down to a much smaller number than that. So yeah, if you guys have any

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questions that you think I might be able to answer, just let me know another time. Oh, and if you have any input on questions you think we should ask the applicants, let me know.

*College Senator Stenger:* So, I am also vice president of our trial association at WVU Law, and coming up we have the 1L Luger Cup. That basically means that first year law students are going to be competing in a trial and they have no idea what they're doing. And it's going to be really fun because what we will need are witnesses. So if you'd like to act, if you'd like to make a big scene, and if you want to have a script all about murder, that'd be really cool. So I'm going to be dropping a Google Form link for you guys to just sign up, and then we'll have you guys as a central roster for people to pick from if they need witnesses.

*College Senator Selders:* This is less about SGA, this is more just the pharmacy school doing stuff. We have an upcoming apothecary ball that will be happening April 25th. Our tickets will be going out in February, so if anyone has an interest, let me know.

## XII. Executive Reports

*Community Engagement Coordinator Ferguson:* Hey everybody, I'm just going to talk a little bit about Month of Service, which is coming up in February. We're really excited about it. But first, I had my meeting with the Alcohol and Other Drugs Committee, and they just, I'd already sent a group me message about this, but just to reiterate, there's a prevention summit happening in the Mountain Layer on Friday, and they just wanted me to share that with students. I believe a lot of faculty will be going, but students are more than welcome to come and participate as well. And please just see that message in the group me that I sent with a link to the website with the specific details about that. So they just asked if I could share. And then the one other thing, not about Month of Service, if you guys went on the service trip to McDowell County in December, if you could just see me really quick after the meeting, I got some thank you cards for Aiden and Anne, who are the ones who coordinated that trip and allowed us to go on that. So I just want the people who went to be able to sign those, so I can get them to Anne and Aiden. Okay, so for Month of Service, I have the two first weeks of February planned out. So we're going to build birdhouses. We've ordered 10 of them to build. So that's going to take place next week in between the meeting. So in between committee and the General Assembly meeting, just because it shouldn't take too long. There's only 10 birdhouses. It's relatively quick to put those together. So most likely, we still need to book a room for it. But I will, I'll put in the group me what room that will be. And I'll have Olivia talk to the committee chairs about that as well. So that will be again, in between meetings, I'll send a more

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specific text about that. And then we're going to put them up either around campus, I'm still coordinating that or donate them to one of the organizations here around Morgantown. And then for the second week, we're going to be, it's a local choice, we're going to be volunteering at the Rosenbaum House just because everyone always loves getting to be able to do that. So that will be on Sunday, the eighth, just because I thought a lot of people would have more availability during that time.

*Logan Pierce, State Government Liaison:* Okay, yeah, so I'm taking this role over full time now, considering that we're gonna have some longer term commitments in Charleston this session, especially with legislation we're trying to pursue, I will be in this role. So you'll get to hear me out just like last semester, if any of you were here last spring. So the stuff that we've been working on so far is obviously, House Bill 4081, which is the same as the house bill that I was pursuing last legislative session actually made it through the house already, it was introduced into the Senate and thank you, introduced into the Senate and it was referred to finance and education. Judging from the tone that I got last session, it should pass the Senate, hopefully, fingers crossed on that, and that completes our advocacy on that on that level. Mind you, we've been doing this for about four years now. So you know, I think it's I think it's due time that we get with it, we get a good win. Other than that, you know, the biggest thing that we're going to direct our effort for is the BOG vote, we're going to attempt to get the student voting right back, student voting rights back on the Board of Governors. So my first trip down to Charleston will be next Tuesday and Wednesday, that'll be WVU day. I do remind you all if you would like to travel to that trip, please sign up for that. There are no other trips besides these, these, these next two, so that would be WVU day. And February 16, we're having student day at the Capitol, there are no other trips besides this unless we decide to go to Charleston. So if you do want to use up your one SGA trip, this is the time to do it. Under the domes, that's the government relations newsletter they send out and they do about probably monthly they post on that. And they talk about what's going on down in Charleston, the newest edition of that just came out. So if you guys are interested in just trying to stay up to date with the legislative session, Travis is the expert, he's the one that he's the one that writes that. The biggest news out of that that I really identified was the governor's proposed budget for 2027 the financial year, WVU is going to get a \$4.8 million increase. So hopefully, you know, the state's pretty receptive to higher education this year. So hopefully we get that in the house and said I ultimately decided to pass that.

## B. New Student Organization Approvals

### 1. Wealth Management Club

*Brady, Evan:* So we are a cohort-based club for students that are serious about wealth management and finance in general. And we're going to learn by doing stock pitches, portfolio simulations, market analysis, client casework, basically anything that's real world experience we think is essential for finance. So we're going to connect students directly with professionals and alumni, as well as real career opportunities that we already have lined up for the students. We're building the next generation of disciplined, ethical financial professionals. Ethics is a big part of finance. And we're leaders who are driven to teach others while also in the process of learning. Obviously, we're students as well. So teaching everybody while you're still learning is a hard thing. But we're going to try our best. What we do. We are dedicated to educating the students on investment strategies, portfolio management, financial planning, interview prep, and just the broader world of wealth management. And you might ask, interview prep is something that I was a little confused about, too, because it's like wealth management interviews. Well, especially in finance, there's a lot of competitive interviews that go on. Not to toot his horn too much, but he got a big internship with JP Morgan. And there's a lot of interviewing that goes into that. And so it's a big part of what we're doing. So we're going to have a real-time investment portfolio competition just to kind of incentivize a lot of participation within the club, kind of make it fun. And hands-on experiences, guest speakers, networking opportunities, things like that. The goal is pretty much to equip members with the real-world financial knowledge that they need to have their portfolios, and along with the rest of the things that come with wealth management that may not be included in the investment side of things. So there's some key points that we'd like to mention that we already have lined up with our club. So the first one is we have multiple connections within the industry who would love to speak to our group and give us insight into what the job is like and answer questions. We have people from big banks, small banks, smaller firms, who are not only willing to talk to our group, but are willing to do mock interviews with our group, which is really

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important to have, as he mentioned, the interview prep with professionals who are actually familiar with interviewing students. That's a big, important point we have. And we have spoken to other finance organizations like Women in Business, the Finance Investment Club, and Mountaineers on Wall Street. And we're going to do a networking event with them. It's actually already in talks to get set up. So we're going to do a networking event with them, and everybody in all of the finance clubs will get to know each other, which is a big part of building the business school better. So another opportunity that we really want to line up and have already kind of started talking about is getting priority for the club members to have externship opportunities, like when they're applying, because they'll get the first opportunity because they're in the club. Just providing more opportunities for ways for people to grow outside of just the club and in the field of business. And then our philanthropy is something that's really important to us. I found the contact for the West Virginia chapters of the contact for the person who represents West Virginia in the AFSP, the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. So the goal is to hold fundraising events and be able to send the money from those to them as our philanthropy. Thank you guys for listening.

### 4. Mountaineer Medical Reserve Corps

*Amelia:* My name is Amelia, and I'm here to ask for approval for the Medical Reserve Corps, specifically for WVU, the Mountaineer Medical Reserve Corps. So this is a student organization that will be modeled off of the national model, which is the Medical Reserve Corps. It is a nationally recognized volunteer service that is utilized during staff shortages and emergencies, such as natural disasters and pandemics. Emergency operations are very diverse. So the volunteers range from IT specialists, medical clinicians, public health specialists, data analysts. So this would be an organization that's open for everyone here on campus. So this student org would aim to get students essential certifications and training and life-saving skills, such as CPR, first aid, naloxone training, and training in basic emergency operation functions. This org will work directly through community partners. When the need arises, community partners can request assistance from the Mountaineer Medical Reserve Corps, and the student volunteers will work under their direct supervision and within their legal scope. So the Monongalia County Health Department has already expressed interest in this, and have already agreed to be a partner that we would have. Currently, I'm working on scheduling a meeting with their department leadership, as well as professionals from the WVU School of Public Health, and also for the Center of Community Engagement. As of right now, just basic potential activities that we have included working the medical tents and

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water stations at sporting events. Also, assisting the health department in Save a Life Day, doing naloxone education and distribution. And then, if the need arises, I hope it does not, but also deployments to larger natural disasters or other emergency issues. Students are safe, no one will ever be forced to do any of these things, and as long as they're under supervision at all times. So this is a club that would allow students to get their service learning hours within a setting that interests them and aligns with their long-term career goals, and if approved, would give students the opportunity to gain essential certifications and life-saving skills, while simultaneously giving back to our community when it needs the most.

Senator Cole moved to the previous question by voice, seconded by Senator Silva.

*Aubrey Bennet, Grant Officer:* West Virginia Rivers is going to have an online training about the legislative session, specifically for anybody who's interested about the environment.
